supplies

- [Size US G \(3.75 mm\) crochet hook](#)
- [Removable stitch markers if needed](#)
- [Yarn needle to weave in ends](#)
- [Scissors](#)

measurements

Length: 60 inches (152 cm)
Width: 16 inches (41 cm)

abbreviations

- Ch - chain
- dc - double crochet
- st(s) - stitch(es)

yarn

- Lion Brand:

yardage

- 1,200 yards (1,098 m)
- 2 Balls Needed

gauge

- 22 sts and 10 rows = 4x4" (10 cm)
in pattern stitch

skill level

- Beginner

Beginner Lace CROCHET PONCHO

Notes

Don't shy away from using a lace yarn and enjoy working up a light, airy, and wearable summer poncho.

- This pattern is worked in rows until the desired length is achieved. It can easily be adjusted to different sizes by working more stitches on the first row for the width, and also crocheting additional length.

LACE PONCHO

Row	Description	Stitch Count
1	Chain 91 To change the width of the poncho chain in multiples of 3 plus 1.	91
2	Dc in 4th ch from hook (this counts as first dc and chain 1 space). Ch 1, dc in next ch, *skip next ch, dc in next ch, ch 1, dc in next ch; repeat from * across to the last 2 chains, skip next ch, dc in last ch, turn.	89
3	Ch 3 (counts as dc), (dc ch 1, dc) in each ch-1 space across to the last ch-1 space, dc in 3rd ch of turning ch, turn.	89
4	Repeat row 3 until piece measures approx 60 inches in length (approx 150 rows). Add or remove rows if adjust the sizing. Fasten off and weave in ends.	

SEAMING

Fold the poncho in half lengthwise. With a yarn needle and yarn, seam the top edge leaving approx 1/3 of the edge open for your head to fit through. The fringe will be placed on the remaining open edges.





FRINGE

When cutting the fringe, wrap the yarn around a card or length of a cell phone and cut once to save time. To attach the fringe on the edges we will be using a larkshead knot.
